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Notice of conclusion of investment agreement with Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA)

On July 3, GREEN HOSPITAL SUPPLY, INC. (GHS), a subsidiary of SHIP HEALTHCARE HOLDINGS, INC., concluded and signed an agreement with the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) on the receipt of JICA investment in the construction and operation of a private general hospital now being developed by Ship Aichi Medical Service Limited (SAMSL) of Bangladesh, also a subsidiary of SHIP HEALTHCARE HOLDINGS. This agreement will provide support for the project involving the expansion and operation of the East West Medical College Hospital (a 280-bed hospital opened in 2000) undertaken by SAMSL, which was established by GHS and Dhaka's East West Medical College.*

"Applying Japanese hospital management expertise to provide the people of Bangladesh with worldclass medical services at affordable cost." Based on this slogan, SAMSL seeks to help strengthen medical care standards in Bangladesh by expanding the East West Medical College Hospital to 650 licensed beds. The project will involve the construction of an annex and a new building and establish new and highly specialized departments at the hospital. The number of hospital beds per 10,000 population in Bangladesh is 6,*2 (vs. a global average of 27 beds and an average of 10 beds among other low-income nations), regarded to be extremely low. The nation is severely lacking in terms of the number of medical professionals as well, with only 0.66 doctors and nurses per 1,000 population.*3 (The World Health Organization defines countries with less than 2.28 doctors and nurses per 1,000 population as severely lacking medical professionals.)

Due to factors such as changing diets and lifestyles, Bangladesh is also undergoing a shift from infectious to noninfectious diseases. Some 61% of all diseases in the country now involve noninfectious disease such as cancer and cardiovascular disease. *4 However, despite these changes in the health challenges facing the nation, the development of a medical infrastructure suitable for addressing noninfectious disease has lagged. The development of hospitals and medical training required to handle advanced medical care have emerged as pressing issues.

Against this backdrop, the government of Bangladesh is advocating a policy of improving medical services through private sector initiatives, with the goal of securing equitable high-quality healthcare for all citizens. Drawing on Japan's hospital management expertise, the project will deliver highly specialized medical services and help support the health policies of the Bangladesh government. The project will also help achieve the Japanese government's future investment strategy (announced in 2017), which seeks to establish 20 Japanese medical care institutions overseas by the year 2020.

To date, aid provided by JICA to the Bangladesh government has addressed improvements in medical facilities, equipment, and supplies, as well as efforts to train nurses through the MCH and Health System Improvement Project (yen loans) (2015*5) and the Project for Capacity Building of Nursing Services (technical cooperation project) (2015–2020*6).
